



Purpose The purpose of this document is to reduce the risk of exposure to blood or other potentially infectious material (OPIM).

Prevent exposure to blood or OPIM To prevent exposure to blood or OPIM use fluid resistant barriers such as:

- gloves,
- face shield,
- goggles, etc.

Consider all blood or OPIM infectious, regardless of the source individual.

Potential blood or OPIM exposure Potential blood or OPIM exposure:

- **immediately wash** any contaminated area with soap and water.
- **report** to supervisor.
- **immediately go to** COPA medical clinic or local healthcare provider.

Area clean-up requirements Clean up requirements if blood or OPIM is in area:

- **contact** housekeeping or security.
- **do not attempt** to clean up.

Contaminated material requires special handling. Dispose only in a pre-labeled biohazards waste container.

Site specific exposure control plans Each COPA asset has a site-specific exposure control plan (ECP).

Workers in scope of ECP	Workers out of scope of ECP
<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • certified to provide first aid or emergency medical assistance. • that may be exposed to bloodborne pathogens or OPIM during work. 	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • provided voluntary first aid and/or CPR training. • with no expectation to help an injured co-worker other than as a Good Samaritan.

- includes exposure determinations for job classifications with potential occupational exposure.
- lists site-specific requirements to protect workers.
- is reviewed annually and updated if needed.

Hepatitis B Vaccine availability

The Hepatitis B vaccine is available:

- to all workers in an ECP within 10 working days of initial assignment.
- within 24 hours post follow-up to workers who have an exposure incident.

Worker training

Worker training will be provided:

Workers in scope of ECP	Workers out of scope of ECP
at time of initial assignment and annually.	one-time awareness training.

Maintain training records for a minimum of three years.
